Eligible applicants are community-based coalitions addressing youth substance  
use that have previously received a DFC grant but have experienced a lapse in  
funding or have concluded the first five-year funding cycle and are applying for a  
second five-year funding cycle (Year 6). For the purposes of this NOFO and the  
DFC Support Program, a coalition is defined as a community-based formal  
arrangement for cooperation and collaboration among groups or sectors of a  
community in which each group retains its identity, but all agree to work together  
toward a common goal of building a safe, healthy, and drug-free community.  
Coalitions that have already received 10 years of DFC funding are not eligible to  
apply.

**Description:**

The Drug-Free Communities (DFC) Support Program was created by the Drug-Free Communities Act of 1997 (Public Law 105-20). The Executive Office of the President, Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP), and the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), National Center for Injury Prevention and Control (NCIPC), Drug-Free Communities Branch are accepting applications for Fiscal Year (FY) 2021 Drug-Free Communities (DFC) Support Program grants. By statute, the DFC Support Program has two goals:

- 1) Establish and strengthen collaboration among communities, public and private non-profit agencies, as well as federal, state, local, and tribal governments to support the efforts of community coalitions working to prevent and reduce substance abuse among youth (individuals 18 years of age and younger).
- 2) Reduce substance abuse among youth and, over time, reduce substance abuse among adults by addressing the factors in a community that increase the risk of substance abuse and promoting the factors that minimize the risk of substance abuse.
